What qualities do you have that make you a good citizen? List them in the answer boxes below.



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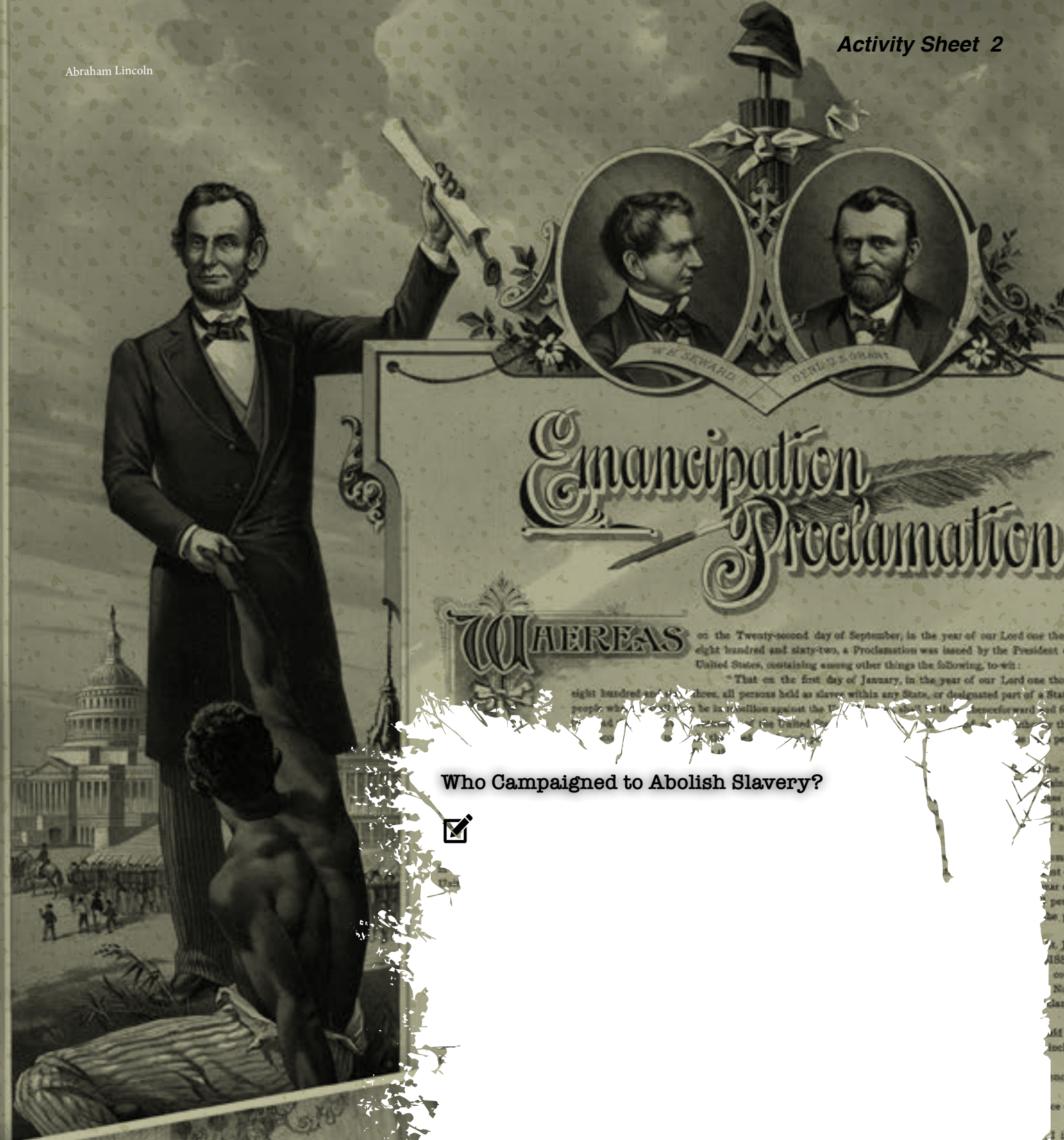

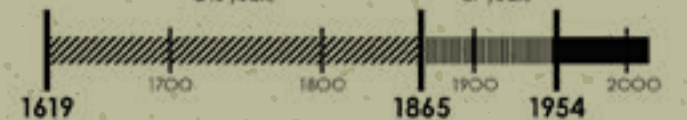

CIVIL RIGHTS IN OTHER COUNTRIES

SOUTH AFRICA**BLACK
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Apartheid was a law against non-white citizens of South Africa. After the all-white government of the National Party gained power in South Africa in 1948, they began enforcing racial segregation. Under apartheid, the non-white South Africans (a majority of the population) were forced to live in separate areas from whites and use separate public facilities. Despite strong opposition to apartheid within and outside of South Africa, its laws remained in effect for almost 50 years. In 1991, the government of President F.W. de Klerk began to repeal most of the legislation that was the basis for apartheid. President de Klerk and activist Nelson Mandela later won the Nobel Peace Prize for their work in creating a new constitution for South Africa.

CIVIL RIGHTS IN OTHER COUNTRIES

AMERICA

American democracy is based on opportunity, freedom, and prosperity. However, these values are mostly reserved for white people of privilege through the intentional exclusion and oppression of people of colour. The racial and ethnic inequalities that exist today are a result of structural racism: the historical and contemporary policies and practices that create white supremacy.

Structural racism continues to disproportionately segregate communities making it more difficult for people of colour to gain a good education, jobs, housing, healthcare, and equal treatment in the criminal justice system.

Following a large number of tragic murders of predominantly young men of colour in the USA that has been globally highlighted through social media coverage and in particular, the murder of George Floyd, the Black Lives Matter movement stepped up their activism against incidents of police brutality and all racially motivated violence against black people.
